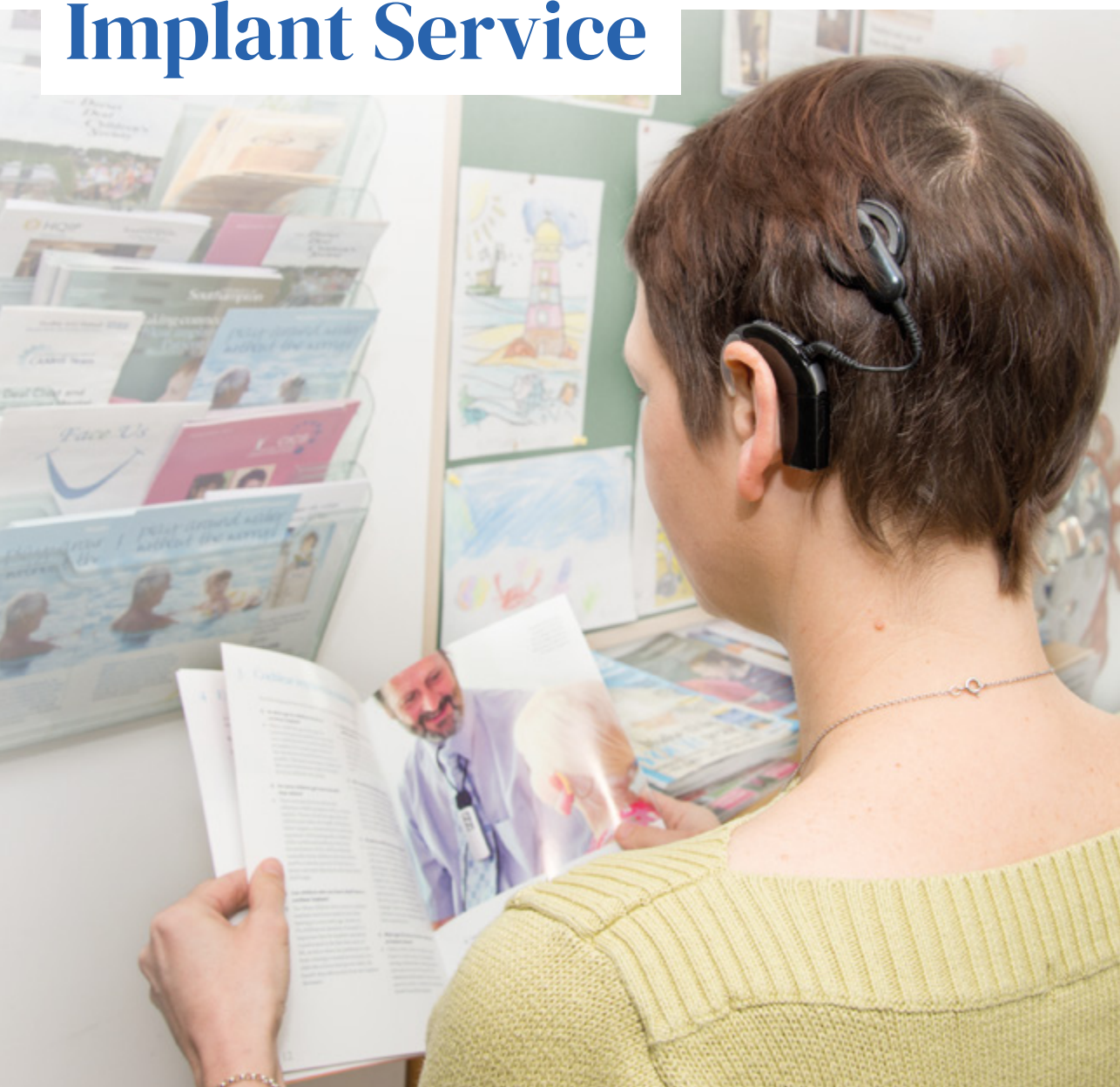


Making connections Self-funded Cochlear Implant Service



At USAIS, we know how big an impact hearing loss has on all aspects of life. Cochlear implants can make a huge difference for those with severe to profound hearing loss, but we recognise that current NHS funding guidelines do not allow everyone who could benefit from a cochlear implant to receive this treatment.

We provide a service for adults who could benefit from cochlear implantation but are not eligible for NHS funding. Some people struggle for years trying to manage with gradually deteriorating hearing and little benefit from hearing aids. At USAIS, we feel that you should be able to access cochlear implant technology as soon as it would be of benefit to you.

What is a cochlear implant?

A cochlear implant is an electronic device that can help people with severe to profound hearing loss who receive limited or no benefit from conventional hearing aids.

It has two parts – an internal part, which is placed in the inner ear under general anaesthetic, and an external part which is worn behind the ear.

Our self-funded service

At USAIS, we have been providing cochlear implants for patients with a hearing loss for more than 25 years. Our multi-disciplinary service has a world-wide reputation for excellence.

Our self-funded service runs parallel to and mirrors our NHS service.

Who is the service for?

The service is for adults who live in the South of England and are registered with a GP in the region. You may be eligible if you have:

- A severe to profound hearing loss in both ears and receive no or limited benefit from conventional hearing aids and do not currently have a cochlear implant
- One cochlear implant at our service and are interested in a second implant for the other ear
- Single sided deafness (SSD) or asymmetrical hearing: severe to profound hearing loss in one ear

We are not currently offering a service for children.

What can I expect from an implant?

People with cochlear implants can benefit from some or all of the following:

- Ability to hear and identify environmental sounds
- Improved lip-reading
- Understanding of speech without lip-reading
- Potential to use the telephone
- Increased confidence and independence in communication with friends, family and work colleagues

There are a number of factors that can influence the outcome, including the cause of deafness, duration of deafness, hearing aid use and any cochlear/ear abnormalities or other concerns. These are all aspects that are considered as part of the assessment process.

Our dedicated multi-disciplinary team comprises of ENT Consultants, Audiological Scientists, Specialist Speech and Language Therapists, Hearing Therapists and Psychologists.

What can I expect from a second implant?

People who have received a second implant report that the change is ‘not as dramatic’ as for their first implant. The second implant can help with:

- Locating where sound is coming from
- Hearing a bit better in noisier environments
- Finding it easier to hear when someone talks on the non-implanted side
- Reducing strain in daily listening
- A sense of hearing being more ‘balanced’
